 - Baking Entries must be brought in by 1 pm on Wednesday June 7th.
 - **Plant & Flower** articles must be in place before **11:30 am, Thursday, June 8th**. Late arrivals may be displayed but are not eligible for judging.
 - Registration for the Saturday Flower Show can be made by 9 pm Friday June 9th.
 - The Saturday Flower Show exhibits must be brought in before 10:30 am on June 10th.
 - Late arrivals may be displayed but are not eligible for judging.
- 2. Items exhibited must remain on display until the close of the Fair on Sunday, June 11th, and can only be picked up **after 4:00 p.m.**
- 3. No exhibits will be accepted after the above-mentioned dates and times. No Refunds. No substitutions.
- 4. Fees: \$2 per entry (taxes included) NO MORE THAN THREE (3) ENTRIES PER CLASS.
- 5. An exhibitor may receive no more than two prizes in any one class.
- 6. **10 articles** must be entered before a free week pass can be given to an exhibitor and one week pass for each additional 10 entries. Passes will only be given upon receipt of required number of articles. **Saturday show entries do not count towards the free passes.
- 7. Study prize list carefully to ensure you have the right numbers on your entry forms and on your tags. Competitors are asked to pick up their tags prior to the fair and have them filled out and fastened securely.
- 8. Entries must be placed in proper section and class in order to compete.
- 9. Articles soiled, defaced by wear or previously shown are not eligible for competition.
- 10. All exhibitors must be responsible for their own exhibits. The Association will not assume responsibility for removal, packing and shipping.
- 11. No prizes will be awarded to any exhibitor for which there is no class.
- 12. Any article already shown is not eligible for the competition.
- 13. No additional wording can be included on the exhibitor's tag, except where stated.
- 14. The judge's decision is final.
- 15. All articles exhibited will be at the sole risk of the exhibitor.
- **16.** Any complaint or concern should be brought to the attention of the President, Darleen Kerr Sabetta, no later than one week following the fair.
- **17.** No cheques will be issued for prizes under \$5. Prizes under that amount must be picked up at the fair office before June 22nd.

Maple Meringue Cookies

4 large egg whites

1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar

1/8 teaspoon salt

1 cup + 2 tablespoon (176g) maple sugar

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 225°F. Line two baking sheets with parchment.
- In the bowl of stand mixer, combine the egg whites, cream of tartar and salt. Beat until soft peaks form.
- With the mixer running at medium speed, gradually add the maple sugar. Beat until the mixture is stiff and glossy.
- Scoop by the quarter cup for large meringues, or pipe in walnut-sized mounds for small meringues. Sprinkle each meringue with a light dusting of additional maple sugar.
- Bake the meringues for 1 hour. Turn off the heat, and leave the meringues in the oven, with the door closed, until they're crunchy all the way through at least 3 hours or preferably overnight.
- Once the meringues are dry, remove from the oven, and store airtight at room temp.
